Hello All,

Maidenhead u3a was founded in 1998 which makes us 25 years old this year. The State of Prisons Today

Today, the UK has over 80,000 people in prison, the highest number in Western Europe. There are frequent reports in the news about appalling conditions and abuses in British jails. Find out from an expert the truth about British prisons, what is being done, and what needs to be done.

Rob Preece has worked on some of the Howard League's most successful campaigns, including Books For Prisoners, which overturned government restrictions preventing people in prison receiving books from family and friends. He was formerly a journalist, specialising in crime and politics.



The Howard League was established in 1866 and named after the prison reformer John Howard. The charity aims to reduce the harm caused by crime and punishment and to build a safer and fairer society for all.

Spitfire Women Review of monthly meeting held on 14th February 2023

Speaker David Horton's subject was the work of the women in the Air Transport Auxiliary (ATA) during WWII. Headquartered at White Waltham, it was a civilian unit created to fly fighter and bomber aircraft from factories to airfields when there was an acute shortage of trained male pilots.

During the war, 1,152 men and 166 women in the ATA delivered 309,00 aircraft of 147 different types. Initial training started in Tiger Moths with no radio or instrument flying instruction. Pilots had to fly with only a compass and map in all weathers, but never at night.

At first, women wore skirts but that proved impractical for flying aircraft so they later wore trousers. Warm gear was essential as planes were not heated. One woman, Lettice Curtis, flew six different aircraft to six different locations on the same day, before nightfall, without mishap. Another flew under the Severn railway bridge, not realising the tide was in, and had a very narrow escape. Yet another crash landed her Swordfish and finished up in the first aid post. Inevitably there were casualties, and they were also attacked by enemy aircraft and had to take evasive action. Deaths were more often due to foul weather than mechanical failure. The graves of some pilots who lost their lives are in All Saints graveyard.

Initially, female pilots were paid 20% less than males, but from 1943 they were paid the same as men. Male pilots were mostly those pilots too old to enlist in the RAF or disabled in some way, such as having only one arm!

David showed a short war film of female pilots and photos and stories about some of them before concluding this well-attended lecture.
