# **MONTHLY MEETING**

# Tuesday, 13th September at 2.30pm

Have you ever wondered where all the insects have gone? In summers past, every car journey meant you had to clean squashed bugs from your windscreen but that is an increasingly rare task. Scientists estimate that more than 40% of insect species are declining and a third are endangered. The rate of extinction is eight times faster than that of mammals, birds and reptiles. No insects means no plant pollination, fewer plants, smaller crops, and less food, with the consequent threat of starvation in affected parts of the world.

Our speaker for September is Kaitlyn Elverson from charity Buglife, Europe's only organisation devoted to the conservation and protection of invertebrates. Buglife's aim is to stop the extinction of invertebrates and achieve sustainable populations. In her talk entitled "Un-bee-lievable Insects and how we can help them" Kaitlyn will explain how insect populations are in crisis. We can stop, and reverse the global declines in our insects, but only if everyone pulls together to do their part. Kaitlyn will tell us what is causing insect decline and the things we can all do to end it.



The talk will be held at the Desborough Bowling Club at 10 Green Lane, Maidenhead SL6 1XZ. Please aim to arrive between 2.00 and 2.15pm.

# Lord George Young on 'Herding Cats' – The Role of a Government Whip in Parliament

Our speaker at the August monthly talk was Lord George Young of Cookham, whose family seat in Cookham goes back to the 18<sup>th</sup> century. Lord Young was educated at Eton and Oxford, then worked as an economist before entering parliament in 1974. He served in the governments of five Conservative Prime Ministers in a variety of positions, several in the Cabinet. An MP from 1974 to 2015, he was Chief Whip of the House of Commons from 2012 to 2014. He was elevated to the House of Lords in 2015 where he served as a junior whip from 2016 to 2019, resigning from Boris Johnson's government over the proroguing of Parliament.

Lord Young explained that he had titled his speech "Herding Cats" because cats are about the hardest of animals to herd, as are Members of Parliament. The key role of the whips is to ensure that the government has sufficient support to push through its legislative programme in Parliament by having a majority in any parliamentary votes. It was a long, difficult and thankless task to round up diffident MPs and persuade them to vote in support of the Government motion, whatever their personal views. It could be even harder keeping them in the chamber during a debate, as some were wont to stray to local restaurants where they could be called to vote by the parliamentary division bells. Lord Young illuminated the audience on the various cunning stratagems that whips had to employ!

As Lord Young pointed out, MPs are expected to vote in accordance with their party's manifesto. It is therefore beholden on them to vote in support of their party's policies, whatever their own feelings. Without Whips to try to herd party members through the correct voting "gate", we would have to have frequent general elections, as happens in some other countries, where MPs split into many minor parties, none of which have the power to rule effectively.

Other important but less formal roles for the Whips are to keep their fingers on the pulse of the party and to keep the Prime Minister informed about the 'mood'. In addition, they help newer MPs to learn the ropes and are the nearest thing that MPs have to an HR department. Another vital aspect is advising the Prime Minister on candidates for ministerial positions whenever a 'reshuffle' is being considered. Talent is not the only consideration, as political leanings, which wing of the party candidates tend towards, and these days gender and diversity all go into the mix.

Lord Young summarized by quoting Churchill who said "democracy is the worst form of Government except for all the others". To make it operate effectively, party whips were clearly needed to perform the thankless task of making sure that all MPs supported their party's policies and voted them in.

Lord Young's speech ended to great applause from the more than one hundred audience, following which he answered questions. His response to 'what advice would you have for a new Prime Minister?' was simply 'ensure unity amongst your party members'. Afterwards, many said how much they had enjoyed the talk.
